With an acrobatic masterpiece, Manuel Fettner received compliments from all during the Nordic World Ski Championships 2013 in Val die Fiemme. The WSC debutant landed after a jump to very good 128 metres from the large hill, but directly after the telemark, a ski loosened.

"I had to get over the fall line somehow", Fettner later said. He bravely stood on the remaining ski and tried to balance it out using his other foot. The impossible worked out – and Fettner cheered like a World Champion. Behind the fall line, he plummeted into the snow. Thanks to his jump, Austria was able to get the decisive lead in the team competition and finally won their only ski jumping gold medal of the World Championships.

A wonderful symbol for strong heroes in life. In the Bible, I read about people, whom God makes so strong that they defy falls and are able to keep their balance. Those who manage, have every reason to be happy and cheer like a World Champion.


"Everything else than the last place would be a sensation", said Costa Cordalis before the start of the 30km race in 1985 during the WSC in Seefeld. First, it was only a craze. But soon, his Greek pride was awakened, Cordalis said. A "gruelling" decision, as he admitted later. Also because he used the wrong wax.

Cordalis crossed the finish line 50 minutes after the winner Gunde Svan (Sweden). He was last. No sensation at all. But in Greece, people were celebrating nevertheless.

World Championships with stars and exotic foreigners bring to mind a large festival, about that Jesus says: They will come from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south, and take their places in the kingdom of God. (Luke 13, 29)

Being defeated hurts. Nevertheless, it can be beneficial, as a glance at the life of Oberstdorf's ski jumping legend Sepp Weiler proves.

Sepp Weiler won a lot in his career. The big title was, however, never granted to him. Also because he was "cheated". During the World Championships in 1941 in Cortina d'Ampezzo, Weiler had the farthest jumps.

Due to the unintelligible scores by the three judges, he did not win a medal, however. For Weiler, an unfair defeat. For ski jumping in general, his defeat brought about progress. The World Federation annulled the competition, and from then on used five judges. The lowest and highest scores are discarded. This applies to this very day.

Sepp Weiler, who would have had his 100th birthday this year, kept his chin up despite the unfair defeat. Together with his friends, Heini Klopfer and Toni Brutscher, he made his big dream come true and constructed the Ski Flying Hill in Stillach valley.

Sepp Weiler did exactly, what the Apostle Paul suggests: "Do not let evil overcome you, but overcome evil by good!" (Romans 12, 21)
